Core Subjects

Core subjects are compulsory subjects designed to develop comprehensive skills in your area of specialisation.

Breadth Subjects

Breadth subjects allow you to gain knowledge and understanding across a broader range of disciplines. You will need to complete a minimum of four subjects from outside Music, including at least one from level 2 or 3.

Music Elective Subjects

Music electives offer the opportunity to broaden your contextual music knowledge, explore other forms of music-making and tailor your degree to complement your area of specialisation. Information about available electives based on your specialisation can be found in the University Handbook.

NOTES ABOUT THE BACHELOR OF MUSIC

Course Structure for Interactive Composition Specialisation

This specialisation requires the successful completion of 300 points:

- 200 points of core music subjects
- 50 points of breadth subjects including at least 12.5 points at level 2 or 3 (and no more than 37.5 points at level 1)
- 50 points of free subjects (either music or breadth) at levels 1 to 3

No more than 125 points may be taken at level 1.

It is recommended that free subjects are undertaken in the third year.

Overseas study
